The horn, engine bay panel supports, bonnet lock and another detail are fitted to the engine bay panel.

YOUR MODEL

You will be building a 1:8 scale replica of a customised 1973 Ford Falcon XB GT. Features include a lift-up bonnet that reveals a detailed engine, opening doors, wind-down windows and an 'active' steering wheel. A remote-control fob illuminates the main lights, brake lights and indicators.

All parts belong to a kit. Collectors' item for adults. Not suitable for children under 14. Some parts may have sharp edges, please handle them with care.

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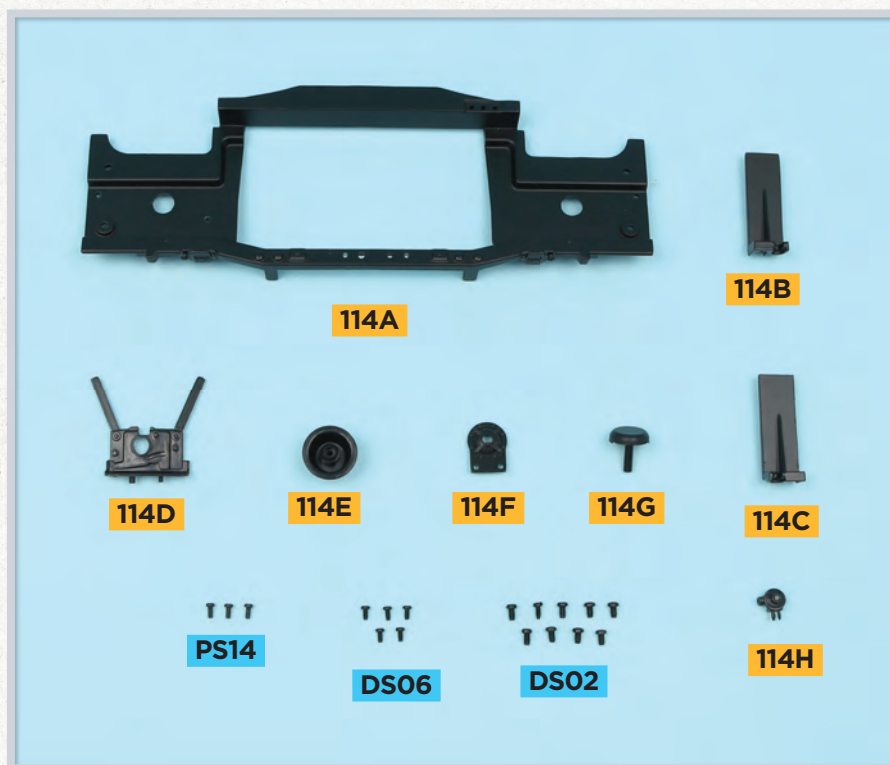
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Stage 114: Engine Bay Fittings

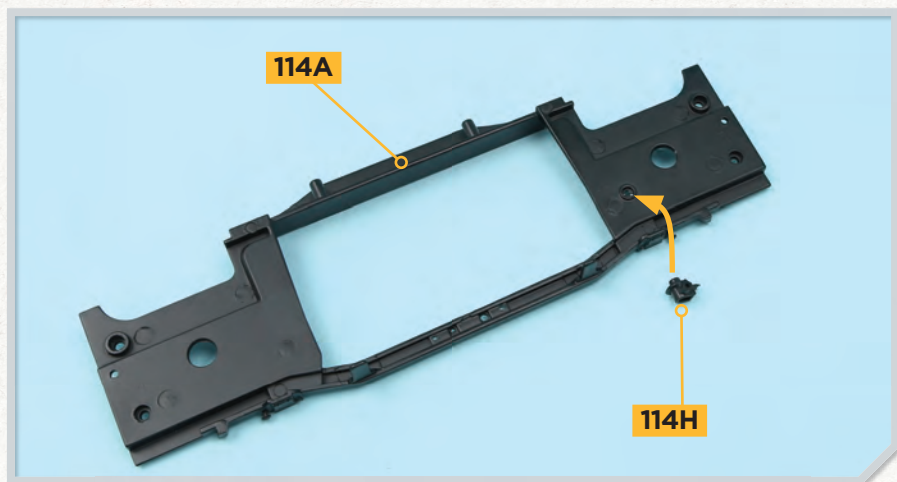

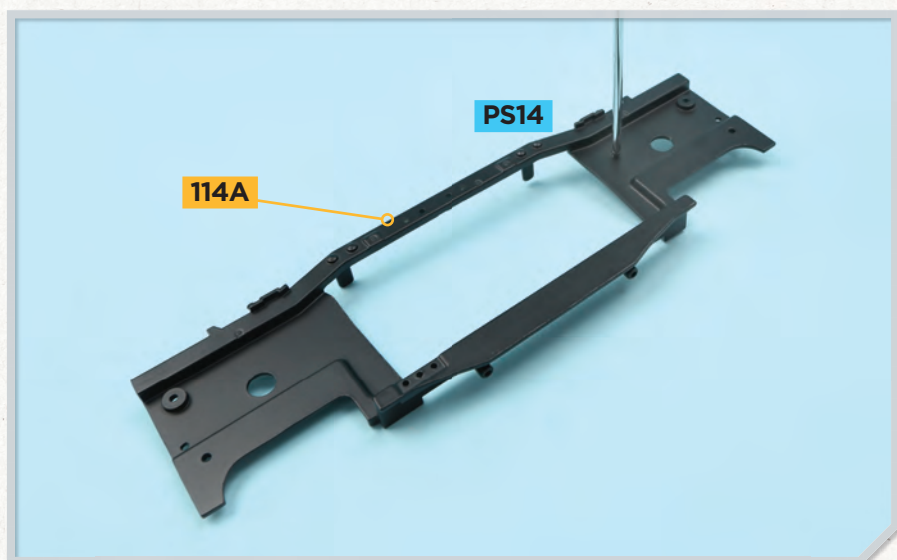


Stage 114: Engine Bay Fittings



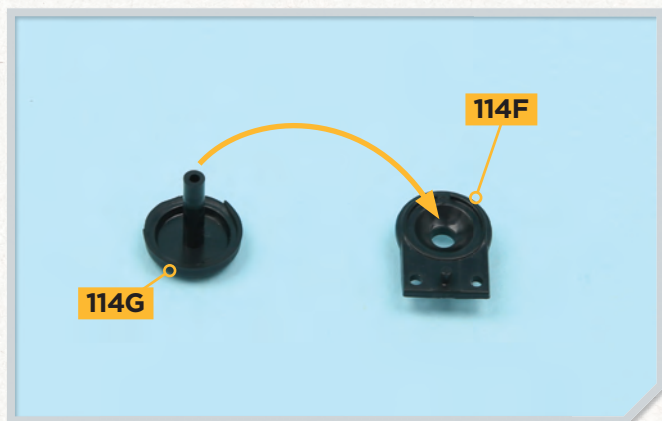
STEP 1

Take the detail **114H** and fit the raised screw socket into the hole in the engine bay panel **114A**.



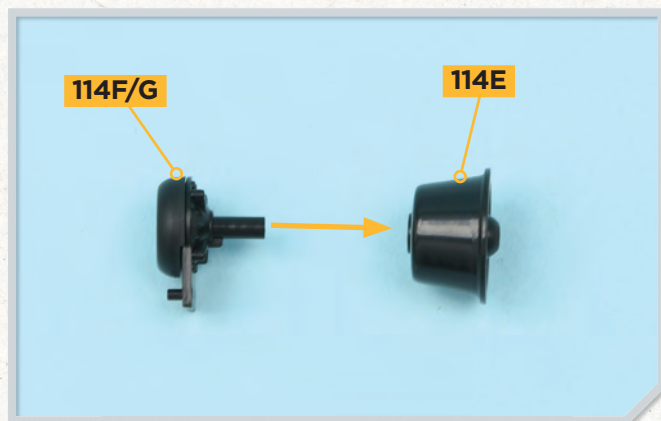
STEP 2

Holding part **114H** in place, turn the engine bay panel **114A** over and fix the detail in place with a **PS14** screw.



STEP 3

Take the horn parts **114G** and **114F** and fit the shaft on part **114G** through the hole in part **114F**.



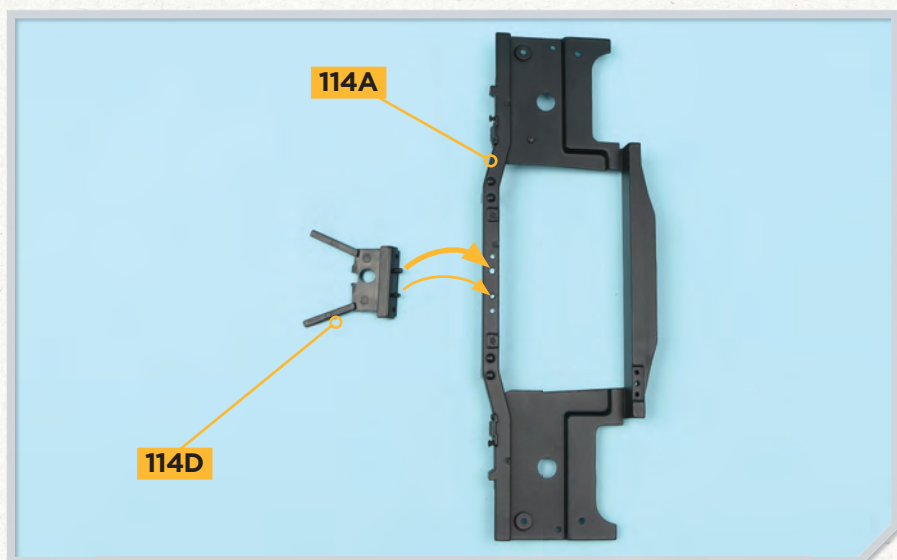
STEP 4

Fit horn part **114E** to the end of the shaft, so that it fits against part **114F**.



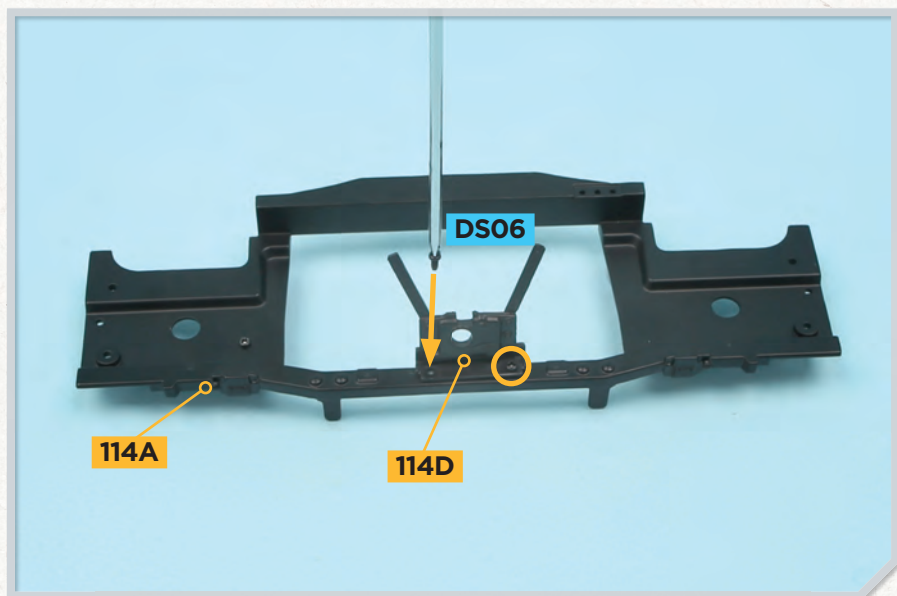
STEP 5

Fix the three horn part assembly together with a **PS14** screw.



STEP 6

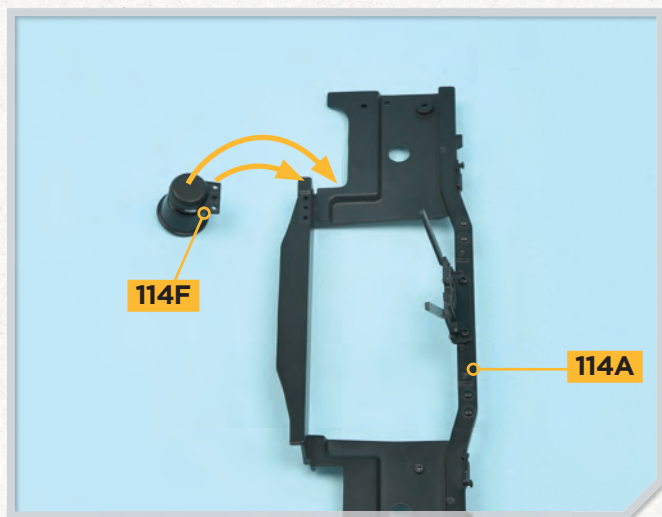
Identify the fixing point for the bonnet closure mechanism **114D**: one of the pegs on part **114D** is larger than the other, and fits into the larger hole in part **114A**. Screw holes in part **114D** need to align with screw holes in the rim of the engine bay panel **114A**.



STEP 7

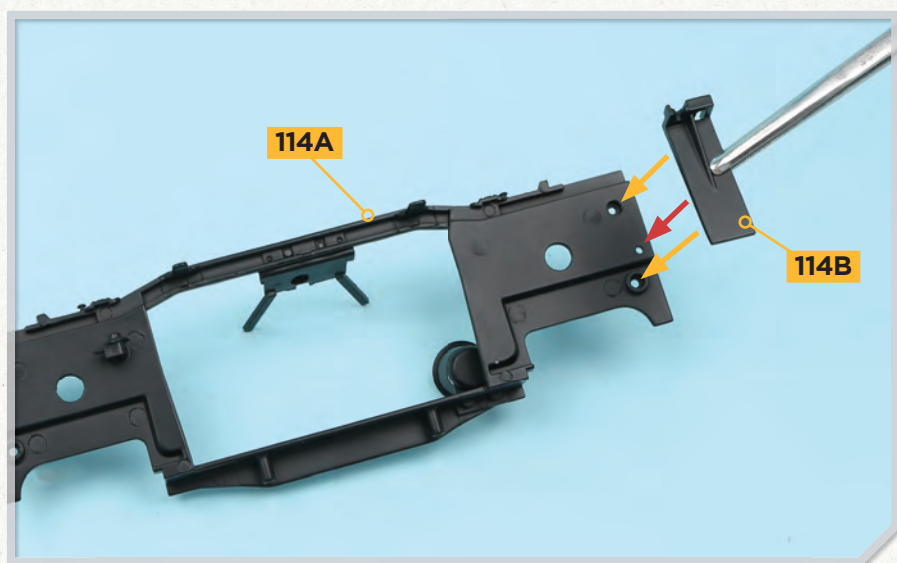
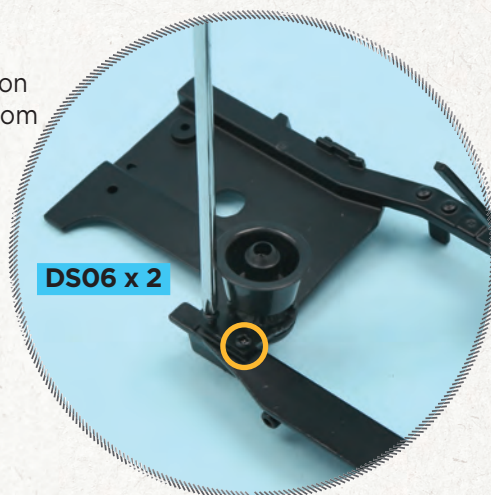
Fix part **114D** in place using two **DS06** screws.

Stage 114: Engine Bay Fittings



STEP 8

Identify the fixing position for the horn assembly from step 5: it is positioned near the corner of the rectangular opening in part **114A**; two screw holes in the corners of part **114F** align with sockets in part **114A**. Fix in place with two **DS06** screws (right).



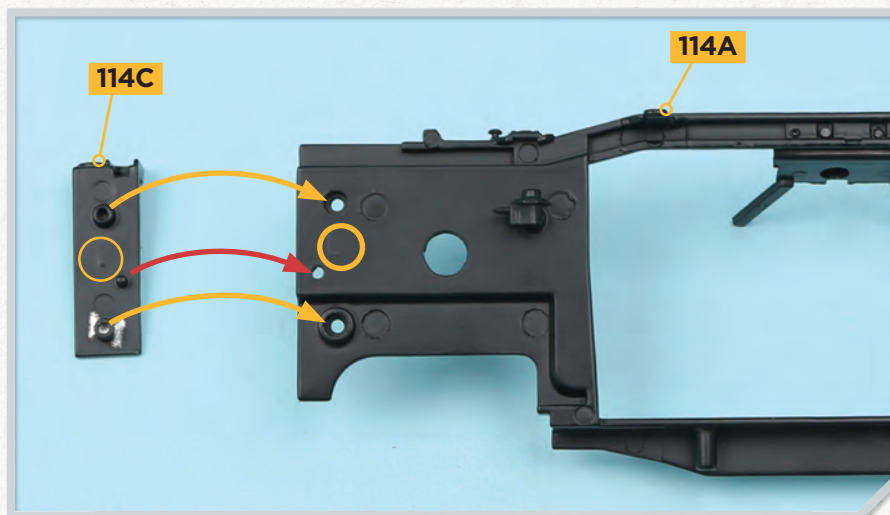
STEP 9

Take the right engine bay panel support **114B** and note that it is marked R. Find the R marking on the end of the engine bay panel **114A**. Check how part **114B** fits to part **114A**, as shown: two screw sockets (yellow arrows) and a peg (red arrow) on part **114B** fit into holes in part **114A**.



STEP 10

Holding part **114B** in place, turn the engine bay panel over and fix in place with two **DS02** screws.



STEP 11

Similarly, take the left engine bay panel support **114C** and note that it is marked L. Find the L marking on the end of the engine bay panel **114A**. Check how part **114C** fits to part **114A**, as shown: two screw sockets (yellow arrows) and a peg (red arrow) on part **114C** fit into holes in part **114A**.



STEP 12

Turn the assembly over and fix the engine bay panel support **114C** in place with two **DS02** screws.

COMPLETED ASSEMBLY

Parts have been fitted to the engine bay panel. The remaining DS02 screws will be used to fix the panel in place in the next issue.

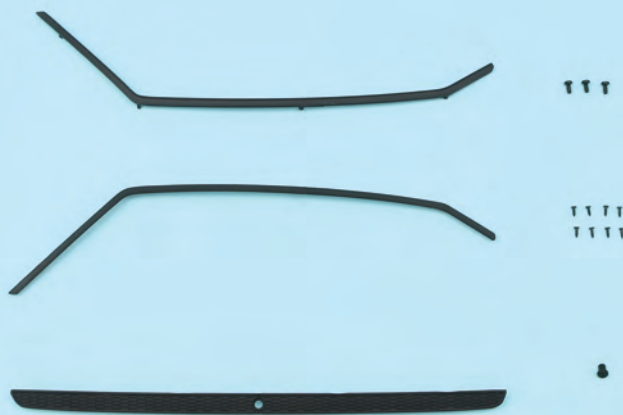
The engine bay panel is fitted into the engine bay and body trims are fixed in place around the side windows.
